Epilepsy versus Seizures



Seizures are characterized by a sudden change in movement, behavior, sensation, or consciousness produced by an abnormal electrical discharge in the brain



Epilepsy is a condition of spontaneously recurring seizures. Having a single seizure does not necessarily mean a person has epilepsy.



Epilepsy tends to be a lifelong condition that affects how electrical energy and connections behave in the brain.





How is epilepsy diagnosed?

Epilepsy is diagnosed by meeting with your neurologist or epileptologist and undergoing a series of tests. You will receive a thorough neurological examination. Your medical history will be reviewed to include a detailed recounting of the seizures. In most cases, an EEG (electroencephalogram) and/or MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) test will be performed. You will meet with your provider after these tests to discuss your overall personal health situation.

How is epilepsy treated?

- » Epilepsy may be treated with anti-seizure medications.
- » For patients who do not respond to medications, the vagus nerve stimulator and resective epilepsy surgery are also options.
- » There are several investigational interventions currently in development. Please discuss these options and your personal situation with your neurologist.

The VA Epilepsy Centers of Excellence

The VA Epilepsy Centers of Excellence (ECoE) is a network of 17 sites across the country that provide comprehensive epilepsy evaluation and care for Veterans with seizure disorders. These sites fall within four regions, which are also known as our Epilepsy Centers of Excellence: Northeast, Southeast, Northwest, Southwest.

What is epilepsy?

Epilepsy is a medical condition that produces seizures that affect a variety of mental and physical functions. When a person has two or more seizures, they are considered to have epilepsy.

What are seizures?

A seizure is a disturbance in the normal regulation pattern of electrical activity within the brain. This abnormal activity within the brain will usually create outward changes in the person experiencing a seizure. In general, seizures last a finite period of seconds to minutes, and then stop on their own.

Signs and symptoms:

- » Muscle spasms
- » Mental confusion
- » Loss of consciousness and/or uncontrolled or aimless body movements
